2. Please list efforts you have made to engage your community (public health information sharing, taking feedback on planning, etc.) in preparing for school in 2020-21. Our staff held a number of listening sessions with parents/families, certified and classified staff regarding reopening. We sent (2) surveys to parents that asked a variety of questions. Parent Q & A sessions were held via Facebook Live events (In English and Spanish) and these were regularly posted on our website and social media. We held a virtual meeting with our migrant families in Spanish. An email address was created for families to email their questions to us. Office staff have been available to answer questions and direct parents to resources. We have utilized Facebook and social media to share information with families, community resources, and information about COVID and how to avoid infection. Our KUA school board has been a part of these discussions and updates. La Clinica has a nurse that is participating on our committee, and we have a Community Health Center on site. Additionally, we held a stakeholder meeting with a diverse group of staff, parents, and community members to review our plan and offer suggestions for improvement. These plans were reviewed and updated in January 2021 with new ODE guidance and CDC regulations. Additionally, our emergency childcare program that has been running onsite since the end of September 2020 has also provided our team with a greater understanding of the necessary strategies to mitigate COVID transmission.

We will continue to offer Comprehensive Distance Learning for any parents who choose this as their learning model due to parent preference.

This will only be offered to families who do not want their child to be on campus for on-site learning. This has been our instructional model since September 28, 2020, in addition to Limited In Person Instruction.

We strive to support the diverse needs of students, families, and employees at Kids Unlimited Academy Charter School, equity and accessibility has been our main focus. All families within our school have been surveyed regarding the challenges and successes related to Distance Learning for All and their preferences and comfort level for both in-person and distance learning for the 2020-21 school year. Additionally, we held listening sessions for parents/guardians and community members. We delivered information and took questions as part of two Zoom/Facebook Live Events with our CEO Tom Cole and Principal Sunshine Price. We have also had a meeting on 8/6/2020 with KUA stakeholders outlining the plan and touring the school through the zoom platform. Our website online Portal has a link to parent needs that allows parents to list concerns and wants for the 2020-21 school year.

This information along with data related to student engagement and success will be used to identify focal communities of students in need of targeted support. Our staff is dedicated to placing our focal communities at the center of our planning for 2020-21 school year. At KUA, our students will have preference to in-person learning. Through the opening of additional classrooms and hiring of more staff KUA has outlined "socially distant" in order to have access to 5 days a week in-person learning. Students will have access to a full-time distance learning at the request of families.

We will provide instruction via Comprehensive Distance Learning with LIPI since September 28, 2020. We have surveyed our parents and 98% of them will sign their child up for on-site learning and will begin on site on January 25, 2021.

KUA White City campus currently holds two Kindergarten classes with a maximum of 25 students per classroom. On January 22, 2021 we transformed our two classrooms into socially distant learning classrooms. On January 25, 2021 KUA White City opened our two socially distant learning classrooms for on-site instruction.

Student Demographics at KUA: ● 97% economically disadvantaged ● 75% are students of color ● 13% experience special needs ● 32% migrant education students ● 52% are emerging bilingual students (Medford location percentages)

-Following all guidelines for classroom space (35 sq. ft. per person)

Training Protocols – Sections 1-3 of RSSL

-All staff were trained via an in person meeting or via Zoom that discussed protocols for physical distancing and to review all guidance in sections 1-3 of the RSSL.

All childcare staff, teachers, and instructional assistants who have been ☑ Process to report to the LPHA any cluster of any illness among staff or working on campus since September in emergency childcare or in LIPI have had continual training and updates as the guidance has changed over time.

> -Staff will complete an additional training before returning to on-site learning on January 25, 2021.

Plans for Systematic Disinfection:

Disinfectant spray bottles and paper towels will be placed inside every classroom, room, and hallways. Before and after meals, students/staff will disinfect desks with disinfectant spray. Bathrooms will be disinfected throughout the day. Bathroom sinks will be sanitized at least every hour, and this will be documented on a log outside the bathroom. High touch points (doorknobs, doors, railing etc.) will be disinfected at least 2 times during the day by school janitorial staff. At the end of each day, the janitorial staff will use an electrostatic cleaner to disinfect high touch points throughout the building and classrooms. Rooms will be used by 1 cohort of students. In the event another cohort or group of staff will be using the same room after school hours, the room will be disinfected before and after use.

> -Classroom and building logs will be pulled by Yuri Gomez and identify anyone who had contact with the COVID positive person, 48 hours before they were symptomatic.

Building logs will be at the entrance of the building and kept at the reception desk. Individual classroom logs will be kept in the rooms. The logs will be collected weekly and stored in an organized filling system. These logs will be kept for a minimum of 30 days.

-Parents will be contacted and students will be sent home early if possible.

-Al itinerant staff will sign in at the White City location upon entry to the

-Staff will be notified if they were exposed to COVID.

-Contact with the district to notify them of the COVID case -Sunshine Price or AJ Schultz will contact the JCPH department and report the COVID case and implement any recommendations they suggest. Logs will be emailed to JCPH indicating when the parent or staff members were notified and will include their names and contact information.

-Letters will be sent home with each student/staff member who was exposed to COVID outlining what happened and the next steps to take. -Anyone who was exposed will be documented on a spreadsheet with the tentative return date to campus. This will ensure students/staff do not return to campus before their quarantine period is over.

Sunshine Price will ensure the school provides weekly updates regarding current instructional models and student counts and reports in ODE's COVID-19 Weekly School Status system.

Staff/Student Screening Protocol for symptoms:

-Students/staff will have their temperature checked upon arriving at the building

-We will verbally ask staff and students if they have any COVID symptoms. If they have a fever or COVID symptoms, they will be sent

-If a staff member or student becomes ill during the school day, they will be screened for symptoms and sent home if necessary.

-Once we receive COVID testing kids and are trained, we will be able to test staff/students on site.

-While sick students are waiting to be picked up or go home, they will be isolated in the health room in the office area

Yuri Gomez will collect the classroom contact logs and report numbers to Sunshine Price. Sunshine Price will make the weekly reports in the ODE COVID-19 School Status system.

The school registered nurse (RN) is responsible for nursing care provided to individual students as outlined in ODE guidance and state law:
 - Communicate with parents and health care providers to determine return to school status and current needs of the student
 - Coordinate and update other health services the student may be receiving in addition to nursing services. This may include speech language pathology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, as well as behavioral and mental health services.
 - Modify Health Management Plans, Care Plans, IEPs, or 504 or other student-level medical plans, as indicated, to address current health care considerations.
 - The RN practicing in the school setting should be supported to remain up to date on current guidelines and access professional support such as evidence-based resources from the Oregon School Nurses Association.

Currently, our White City location does not have any students who are medically fragile, complex and nursing-dependent. In the event we have students who are medically fragile, we will consult with the district nurse to develop the best support plan. Students will be allowed to continue through CDL if required or desired.

Staff and KUA administrators, in partnership with school nurses, or other school health providers, should work with interdisciplinary teams to address individual student needs. We will modify 504 plans or IEPs as needed to support student learning during this time.

Appropriate PPE will be provided for all staff.

1c. PHYSICAL DISTANCING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- □ Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional guidance, establish an outside learning space for learning that maintains minimum 35 square feet per person.
 - Within this design, educators should have their own minimum of 35 square feet and the design of the learning environment must allow for some ability for the educator to move through the room efficiently and carefully without breaking 6 feet of physical distance to the maximum extent feasible.
- Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.
- ☑ Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.
- Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building or outside learning space (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).

Classrooms will be measured, and floor plans consulted. A minimum of 35 square feet per person will be in each classroom.

If implementing Learning Outside | Physical distancing will be supported in the classroom and teachers will make every effort to avoid activities that require students to be closer to one another. The spacing efforts in the classroom provide all instructors in the room with the ability to move efficiently without breaking the 6 feet of physical distance.

> One-way traffic paths will be established and space markers for waiting in lines will be used in the classroom and hallways.

> This building currently has only Kindergarten students and 1 preschool classroom. Students will be kept in separate classrooms to avoid interactions with different cohorts. Recess times will be limited to 1 classroom at a time on the playground or play areas.

> Students who need additional support with physical distancing or mask wearing will work with our VIBE advocacy team. Whole group, small group and individual lessons will be provided for students.

Staff meetings will be held via Zoom or outdoors with sufficient physical distancing. Staff will always be able to attend meetings via Zoom if they

1d. COHORTING

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Where feasible, establish stable cohorts: groups shall be no larger than can be accommodated by the space available to provide 35 square feet per person, including staff.
 - The smaller the cohort, the less risk of spreading disease. As cohort groups increase in size, the risk of spreading disease increases.
- ☑ Students cannot be part of any single cohort, or part of multiple cohorts that exceed a total of 100 people within the educational week⁴, unless the school is offering Learning Outside, then they must follow guidelines for cohorting in Learning Outside guidance. Schools |See above for contact tracing protocols must plan to limit cohort sizes to allow for efficient contact-tracing and minimal risk for exposure. Cohorts may change week-to-week, but must be stable within the educational week.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

Students will be in a cohort with no more than 24 students and will have a minimum of 35 sq. feet per person in the classroom.

There are 2 stable cohorts that are staffed by one instructional aide and one teacher. These cohorts do not have interaction during the day. Due to the number of classes the amount of staff that interact with both cohorts is very minimal.

This location only has 1 set of restrooms for boys and girls. The sinks will be sprayed with disinfectant between cohorts in the bathroom. It will be

⁴ The cohort limit is focused on the students experience and their limit of 100 people includes every person they come into contact with, including staff. There is not a limitation for staff in cohort size while care should be given to design and attention to the additional requirements.

- ⊠ Each school must have a system for daily logs to ensure contract tracing among the cohort (see section 1a of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).
- Minimize interaction between students in different stable cohorts (e.g., access to restrooms, activities, common areas). Provide access to All Gender/Gender Neutral restrooms.
- Cleaning and sanitizing surfaces (e.g., desks, dry erase boards, door handles, etc.) must be maintained between multiple student uses, even in the same cohort.
- □ Design cohorts such that all students (including those protected under ADA and IDEA) maintain access to general education, gradelevel academic content standards⁵, and peers.
- Minimize the number of staff that interact with each cohort to the extent possible, staff who interact with multiple stable cohorts must wash/sanitize their hands between interactions with different stable cohorts.
- ☑ Elementary staff who interact with multiple cohorts (music, PE, library, paraprofessionals who provide supervision at recesses, etc.) should have schedules altered to reduce the number of cohorts/students they interact within a week. Consider having these staff engage via technology, altering duties so that they are not in close contact with students in multiple cohorts, or adjust schedules to reduce contacts.

Staff are trained in COVID protocols and procedures on site. We will continue staff training in control measures and check for completion. Cleaning logs are located outside of each restroom and on the playground in order to track that cleaning takes place. Our maintenance director reviews these logs to ensure proper cleaning happens.

1f. ENTRY AND SCREENING

OHA/ODE Requirements

We will follow all guidance from the CDC and be aware of emergency signs that require immediate attention.

Screening on Entry

- Students and staff are directed to stay home if they, or anyone in their homes or community living spaces, have COVID-19 symptoms, or if anyone in their home or community living spaces has COVID-19.
- Kids Unlimited Academy will follow the LPHA's advice on restricting any student or staff known to have been exposed (e.g., by a household member) to COVID-19 within the previous 14 calendar days.
- Staff are required to report to their supervisor when they may have been exposed to COVID-19 or have symptoms related to COVID-19.
- All students will be visually screened for symptoms on entry to bus and school buildings every day.
- Parents will be asked to report actual symptoms when calling in students sick as part of communicable disease surveillance.
- Transportation specific screening protocols will be followed (see section 2i).

Hand Hygiene on Entry

- All people entering the building shall wash or sanitize hands on entry to school buildings every day.

Symptomatic Staff and Students

- Anyone displaying or reporting the primary symptoms of concern must be isolated and sent home as soon as possible (see section 1i of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance). They must remain home until 24 hours after fever is gone (without use of fever reducing medicine) and other symptoms are improving.
- Staff or students with a chronic or baseline cough that has worsened or is not well-controlled with medication should be excluded from school.

Accommodations under ADA or IDEA and providing FAPE while attending to Face Covering Guidance

- ☑ If any student requires an accommodation to meet the requirement for face coverings, districts and schools must limit the student's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure. Appropriate accommodations could include:
 - Offering different types of face coverings and face shields that may meet the needs of the student.
 - Spaces away from peers while the face covering is removed; students must not be left alone or unsupervised.
 - Short periods of the educational day that do not include wearing the face covering, while following the other health strategies to reduce the spread of disease.
 - Additional instructional supports to effectively wear a face covering.
- For students with existing medical conditions and a physician's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts must not deny any in-person instruction.
- Schools and districts must comply with the established IEP/504 plan prior to the closure of in-person instruction in March of 2020, or the current plan in effect for the student if appropriately developed after March of 2020.
 - If a student eligible for, or receiving services under a 504/IEP, cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, the school or district must:
 - Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan including on-site instruction with accommodations or adjustments.
 - Not make placement determinations solely on the inability to wear a face covering.
 - 3. Include updates to accommodations and modifications to support students in plans.
 - For students protected under ADA/IDEA, who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering, the school or district must:
 - Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan.
 - The team must determine that the disability is not prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement.
 - If the team determines that the disability is prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement, follow the requirements for students eligible for, or receiving services under, a 504/IEP who cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability,
 - If a student's 504/IEP plan included supports/goals/instruction for behavior or social emotional learning, the school team must evaluate the student's plan prior to providing instruction through Comprehensive Distance Learning.
 - Hold a 504/IEP meeting to determine equitable access to educational opportunities which may include limited in-person instruction, on-site instruction with accommodations, or Comprehensive Distance Learning.

- For students with existing medical conditions, doctor's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, KUA will not deny access to On-Site instruction.
- Kids Unlimited Academy will comply with the established IEP/504 plans prior to the closure of in-person instruction in March of 2020. If needed IEP/504 plans will be modified to meet the needs of each student.
- Kids Unlimited Academy will consider child find implications for students who are not currently eligible for, or receiving services under, a 504/IEP who demonstrate an inability to consistently wear a face covering or face shield as required. Ongoing inability to meet this requirement may be evidence of the need for an evaluation to determine eligibility for support under IDEA or Section 504.
- If a staff member requires an accommodation for the face covering or face shield requirements, Kids Unlimited Academy will limit the staff member's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure.

We will follow all ADA or IDEA accommodations as needed or recommended by a doctor.

Students will be provided the same education as their peers, regardless of their health status or ability to wear masks. We will collaborate with their doctors and or parents to find the best solution to keep them safe at school.

We will implement all IEPs and 504 plans as written and will not make changes to them due to a student's reluctance to wearing a face mask.

Any staff who are unable to wear a face mask will need a doctor's note to wear a face shield in order to keep other staff/students safe.

1i. ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day.
- ☐ Protocols for screening students, as well as exclusion and isolation protocols for sick students and staff identified at the time of arrival or students/staff and excluding or isolating them as needed. during the school day. See the COVID-19 Exclusion Summary Guide.
 - Work with school nurses, health care providers, or other staff with expertise to determine necessary modifications to areas where staff/students will be isolated. If two students present COVID-19 symptoms at the same time, they must be isolated at once. If separate rooms are not available, ensure that six feet distance is maintained. Do not assume they have the same illness. Consider if and where students and staff will be isolated during learning outside. Create a comfortable outdoor area for isolation or follow plan for in building isolation.
 - Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.

 - Additional guidance for nurses and health staff for providing care to students with complex needs.

- The protocols for exclusion and isolation for sick students and staff whether identified at the time of bus pick-up, arrival to school, or at any time during the school day are available at kuoregon.org.
- Kids Unlimited Academy staff will be provided on the signs of illness, guidelines for isolation, and appropriate measures to take, should a student or staff member display COVID-19 symptoms upon entry to school or at any time during the school day.
- A primary isolation area will be designated for symptomatic Staff and students at all sites. Supervision will be provided by the District Nurse or school personnel trained by the District Nurse. If necessary, secondary isolation areas will be identified in collaboration with the District Nurse and site administrator.
- A separate designated area will be available for "well" students to medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may access health care for routine first aid and medication administration. Symptomatic students will not have access to this area.

Exposed or Symptomatic Students and Staff

 - Office staff health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than six feet) should wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual should be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care
 - After removing PPE, hands should be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
 - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual should continue to wear a face covering.

- If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual shall wear a face covering.
- To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- ☑ Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- ☑ Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in "Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."
- ☐ Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).
- ☑ Record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.
- ☐ The school must provide a remote learning option for students who are required to be temporarily off-site for isolation and quarantine.

- To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing will be provided to exposed or symptomatic students and staff.
- The Administrator or designee at the location of students or staff that have been exposed or are symptomatic will contact parent/guardian or significant other to transport the student or staff member home. If necessary, transportation by bus can be made.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms.
- Symptomatic staff or students should be evaluated and seek COVID-19 testing from their regular physician or through the local public health authority.
 - If they have a positive COVID-19 viral (PCR) test result, the person should remain home for at least 10 days after illness onset and 24 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and other symptoms are improving.
 - If they have a negative COVID-19 viral test (and if they have multiple tests, all tests are negative), they should remain home until 24 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and other symptoms are improving.
 - If a clear alternative diagnosis is identified as the cause of the person's illness (e.g., a positive strep throat test), then usual disease-specific return-to-school guidance should be followed and person should be fever-free for 24 hours, without use of fever reducing medicine. A physician note is required to return to school, to ensure that the person is not contagious.
 - If they do not undergo COVID-19 testing, the person should remain at home for 10 days and until 24 hours after fever is gone, without use of fever reducing medicine, and other symptoms are improving.
- Kids Unlimited Academy will record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.

This includes students who were scheduled to start the school year, but who have not yet attended. When enrolling a student from another school, schools must request documentation from the prior school within 10 days of enrollment per OAR 581-021-0255 to make all parties aware of the transfer. Documentation obtained directly from the family does not relieve the school of this responsibility. After receiving documentation from another school that a student has enrolled, drop that student from your roll. - ☑ Handwashing: All people on campus shall be advised and encouraged to frequently wash their hands or use hand sanitizer.
- Equipment: Develop and use sanitizing protocols for all equipment used by more than one individual or purchase equipment for individual use.
- ☑ Events: Cancel, modify, or postpone field trips, assemblies, athletic events, practices, special performances, school-wide parent meetings and other large gatherings to meet requirements for physical distancing.
- ☑ Transitions/Hallways: Limit transitions to the extent possible. Create hallway procedures to promote physical distancing and minimize gatherings.
- Personal Property: Establish policies for identifying personal property being brought to school (e.g., refillable water bottles, school supplies, headphones/earbuds, cell phones, books, instruments, etc.).

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- Handwashing: Students/staff will hand wash or use sanitizer multiple times per day and before meal times.
- Equipment: Each cohort will have separate materials and shared equipment will be sanitized between cohorts.
- Events: We will only offer events online via Zoom at this time.
- Transitions/Hallways: The building flow and patterns of migration have been established to minimize multiple cohorts in the hallways at the same time.
- Personal Property: We have encouraged staff to take home all personal property that is not needed for instruction. Students will not be allowed to bring non-essential materials to school. Classrooms have been cleaned out to limit the amount of materials in them.

2e. ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

OHA/ODE Requirements

- Physical distancing, stable cohorts, square footage, and cleaning requirements must be maintained during arrival and dismissal procedures.
- Assign students or cohorts to an entrance; assign staff member(s) to conduct visual screenings (see section 1f of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).
- Ensure accurate sign-in/sign-out protocols to help facilitate contact tracing by the LPHA. Sign-in procedures are not a replacement for entrance and screening requirements. Students entering school after arrival times must be screened for the primary symptoms of concern.
 - Eliminate shared pen and paper sign-in/sign-out sheets.
 - Ensure hand sanitizer is available if signing children in or out on an electronic device.
- ☑ Ensure alcohol-based hand sanitizer (with 60-95% alcohol) dispensers are easily accessible near all entry doors and other high-traffic areas. Establish and clearly communicate procedures for keeping caregiver drop-off/pick-up as brief as possible.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

As students arrive in the morning they will go directly to their classrooms. At the end of the day they will remain in their rooms and the person at the front office will radio to each room to get them to come to the office.

Staff will be assigned to the entrance (we only have 1 student entrance in our building with 2 Kinder classrooms).

Hand sanitizer stations (with 60-95% alcohol) are at the front door and outside each classroom.

2f. CLASSROOMS/REPURPOSED LEARNING SPACES

OHA/ODE Requirements

☑ Seating: Rearrange student desks and other seat spaces so that staff and students' physical bodies are six feet apart to the maximum

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

- extent possible while also maintaining 35 square feet per person; assign seating so students are in the same seat at all times.
- ☑ Materials: Avoid sharing of community supplies when possible (e.g., scissors, pencils, etc.). Clean these items frequently. Provide hand sanitizer and tissues for use by students and staff.
- ☑ Handwashing: Remind students (with signage and regular verbal reminders from staff) of the utmost importance of hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette. Respiratory etiquette means covering coughs and sneezes with an elbow or a tissue. Tissues shall be disposed of in a garbage can, then hands washed or sanitized immediately.
 - Wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.

- Seating: Students will have 35 sq. feet per person in the classroom and we will assign students to seats.
- Materials: We will avoid the use of community shared materials.
 Individual materials will be provided for each student or sanitized between use with different students.
- Handwashing: Lessons on hand washing will occur frequently and as needed. Staff will supervise hand washing when possible to ensure students are washing their hands appropriately.

2g. PLAYGROUNDS, FIELDS, RECESS, BREAKS, AND RESTROOMS

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ⊠ Keep school playgrounds closed to the general public until park playground equipment and benches reopen in the community (see Oregon Health Authority's <u>Specific Guidance for Outdoor Recreation</u> <u>Organizations</u>).
- After using the restroom students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds. Soap must be made available to students and staff. For learning outside if portable bathrooms are used, set up portable hand washing stations and create a regular cleaning schedule.
- ☑ Before and after using playground equipment, students must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol.
- Designate playground and shared equipment solely for the use of one cohort at a time. Outdoor playground structures require normal routine cleaning and do not require disinfection. Shared equipment (balls, jump ropes, etc.) should be cleaned and disinfected at least daily in accordance with <u>CDC guidance</u>.
- ☑ Cleaning requirements must be maintained (see section 2j of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).
- Maintain physical distancing requirements, stable cohorts, and square footage requirements.
- ☑ Provide signage and restrict access to outdoor equipment (including sports equipment, etc.).
- Design recess activities that allow for physical distancing and maintenance of stable cohorts.
- Clean all outdoor equipment at least daily or between use as much as possible in accordance with <u>CDC guidance</u>.
- ☑ Limit the number of employees gathering in shared spaces. Restrict use of shared spaces such as conference rooms, break rooms, and elevators by limiting occupancy or staggering use, maintaining six feet of distance between adults. Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable space, understanding that tables and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. Note: The largest area of risk is adults eating together in break rooms without face coverings.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

The school playground Is not open to the public.

Students will wash their hands after using the bathroom. Staff will try to monitor the restroom when they go in a large group.

Students will wash hands before and after using playground equipment.

Playground equipment will not be shared between cohorts or will be sanitized before the next group uses it.

Recess & PE activities will be designed to keep students apart from one another and to reinforce the 6 feet of distance expectation.

We will limit the number of staff that are allowed in the staff room or break room.

2h. MEAL SERVICE/NUTRITION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☐ Include meal services/nutrition staff in planning for school reentry.
- ☑ Prohibit self-service buffet-style meals.
- ☑ Prohibit sharing of food and drinks among students and/or staff.
- At designated meal or snack times, students may remove their face coverings to eat or drink but must maintain six feet of physical

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

We will serve 3 healthy meals per day in individual disposable meal boxes.

Students will eat meals in their classrooms. They may remove their mask while eating.

- distance from others, and must put face coverings back on after finishing the meal or snack.
- ☑ Staff serving meals and students interacting with staff at mealtimes must wear face coverings (see section 1h of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance). Staff must maintain 6 feet of physical distance to the greatest extent possible. If students are eating in a classroom, staff may supervise from the doorway of the classroom if feasible.
- ☑ Students and staff must wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-95% alcohol before meals and shall be encouraged to do so after.
- Appropriate daily cleaning of meal items (e.g., plates, utensils, transport items).
- Cleaning and sanitizing of meal touch-points and meal counting system between stable cohorts.
- ☑ Adequate cleaning and disinfection of tables between meal periods.
- Since staff must remove their face coverings during eating and drinking, limit the number of employees gathering in shared spaces. Restrict use of shared spaces such as conference rooms and break rooms by limiting occupancy or staggering use. Consider staggering times for staff breaks, to prevent congregation in shared spaces. Always maintain at least six feet of physical distancing and establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. Wear face coverings except when eating or drinking and minimize time in spaces where face coverings are not consistently worn.

Students may not share drinking bottles.

All staff serving meals must wear a face covering

2i. TRANSPORTATION

OHA/ODE Requirements

- ☑ Include transportation departments (and associated contracted providers, if used) in planning for return to service.
- ☑ Buses are cleaned frequently. Conduct targeted cleanings between routes, with a focus on disinfecting frequently touched surfaces of the bus (see section 2j of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance).
- Staff must use hand sanitizer (containing between 60-95% alcohol) in between helping each child and when getting on and off the vehicle. Gloves are not recommended; hand sanitizer is strongly preferred. If hand sanitizer is not available, disposable gloves can be used and must be changed to a new pair before helping each child.
- Develop protocol for loading/unloading that includes visual screening for students exhibiting symptoms and logs for contact-tracing. This must be done at the time of arrival and departure.
 - If a student displays COVID-19 symptoms, provide a face covering (unless they are already wearing one) and keep six feet away from others. Continue transporting the student.
 - The symptomatic student shall be seated in the first row of the bus during transportation, and multiple windows must be opened to allow for fresh air circulation, if feasible.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

The busses will follow the EPSD 9 cleaning protocol.

As students arrive we will use sanitizer between students getting out of the vehicle and coming inside.

Students will have a health check daily before entering the building (see above)

We will inform parents about transportation and teach students the bus protocols for safety.

All students in grades K-8th will be required to wear face coverings.

Staff are also required to wear face coverings.

- The symptomatic student shall leave the bus first.
 After all students exit the bus, the seat and surrounding surfaces must be cleaned and disinfected.
- If arriving at school, notify staff to begin isolation measures.
 - If transporting for dismissal and the student displays an onset of symptoms, notify the school.
- ☑ Consult with parents/guardians of students who may require additional support (e.g., students who experience a disability and require specialized transportation as a related service) to appropriately provide service.
- ☑ Drivers must wear masks or face coverings while driving, unless the mask or face covering interferes with the driver's vision (e.g., fogging of eyeglasses). Drivers must wear face coverings when not actively driving and operating the bus, including while students are entering or exiting the vehicle. A face shield may be an acceptable alternative, only as stated in Section 1h of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance.
- ☑ Inform parents/guardians of practical changes to transportation service (i.e., physical distancing at bus stops and while loading/unloading, potential for increased route time due to additional precautions, sanitizing practices, and face coverings).
- ☑ Face coverings for all students, applying the guidance in section 1h of the Ready Schools, Safe Learners guidance to transportation settings. This prevents eating while on the bus.
- ☑ Take all possible actions to maximize ventilation: Dress warmly, keep vents and windows open to the greatest extent possible.

2j. CLEANING, DISINFECTION, AND VENTILATION

Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems shall, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and interior doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present. Do not prop open doors that can pose a safety or security risk to students and staff (e.g., exterior doors and fire doors that must remain closed.)
- Schools with HVAC systems should ensure all filters are maintained and replaced as necessary to ensure proper functioning of the system.
- All intake ports that provide outside air to the HVAC system should be cleaned, maintained, and cleared of any debris that may affect the function and performance of the ventilation system.
- ☑ Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do <u>not</u> use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Consider using window fans or box fans positioned in open windows to blow fresh outdoor air into the classroom via one window, and indoor air out of the classroom via another window. Fans must not be used in rooms with closed windows and doors, as this does not allow for fresh air to circulate.
- Consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special health care needs receive medication or treatments.
- ☑ Facilities must be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see <u>CDC's guidance on</u> disinfecting public spaces).
- Consider modification or enhancement of building ventilation where feasible (see <u>CDC's guidance on ventilation and filtration</u> and <u>American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning</u> <u>Engineers' guidance</u>).

- ☑ They have a current and complete RSSL Blueprint and are complying with Sections 1-3 of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance and any other applicable sections, including Section 2L of the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance.
- ☑ The school maintains a fully-closed residential campus (no nonessential visitors allowed), and normal day school operations are only offered remotely through distance learning.
- □ There have been no confirmed cases of COVID-19 among school staff or students in the past 14 days.
- - Limit travel to essential functions.
 - Carefully monitor their own health daily and avoid coming to campus at any potential symptom of COVID-19.
- ☑ Any boarding students newly arriving to campus will either:
 - Complete a quarantine at home for 14 days* prior to traveling to the school, OR
 - Quarantine on campus for 14 days.*

* A 14-day quarantine is the safest option to prevent the spread of COVID-19 to others. However, in either option above, for boarding students who have not developed any symptoms, schools may consider ending quarantine after 10 days without any testing, or after 7 days with a negative result on a COVID-19 viral test collected within 48 hours before ending quarantine, unless otherwise directed by the local public health authority (LPHA).

Student transportation off-campus is limited to medical care.

- ☑ Drills can and should be carried out <u>as close as possible</u> to the procedures that would be used in an actual emergency. - Establish a proactive plan for daily routines designed to build self-regulation skills; self-regulation skill-building sessions can be short (5-10 minutes), and should take place at times when the student is regulated and/or is not demonstrating challenging behaviors.

Hybrid/Onsite Plan

We will use our Mindfulness Room to allow students to desolate when needed. We will provide classroom instruction about regulation and how to problem solve with peers.

For students who have behavioral struggles our VIBE Behavioral Support team will check in daily with those students.

Staff will be trained in de-escalation strategies to help avoid triggering students and escalating situations.

Staff will use calming words to help recognize student's feelings and support them with calming down. If a student elopes from an area, staff will use the least restrictive interventions to maintain physical safety for the student and staff member. Certain staff will be trained in CPI to learn additional de-escalation strategies.

- □ Ensure all staff are trained to support de-escalation, provide lagging skill instruction, and implement alternatives to restraint and seclusion.
- ☑ Ensure that staff are trained in effective, evidence-based methods for Emergency Drills developing and maintaining their own level of self-regulation and resilience to enable them to remain calm and able to support struggling students as well as colleagues.

 - Student engages in physically aggressive behaviors that preclude the possibility of maintaining physical distance and/or require physical de-escalation or intervention techniques other than restraint or seclusion (e.g., hitting, biting, spitting, kicking, selfinjurious behavior).
 - If staff need to intervene for student safety, staff should:
 - Maintain student dignity throughout and following the incident.
 - Use empathetic and calming verbal interactions (i.e. "This seems hard right now. Help me understand... How can I help?") to attempt to re-regulate the student without physical intervention.
 - Use the least restrictive interventions possible to maintain physical safety for the student and staff
 - Wash hands after a close interaction.
 - Note the interaction on the appropriate contact log.
 - *If unexpected interaction with other stable cohorts occurs, those contacts must be noted in the appropriate contact logs.
